

HOW I ACT

The "How I Act" plan is used at Seaford Christian Academy to motivate and encourage each student to attain spiritual growth, proper responsibility, and appropriate behavior.

The "How I Act" behavior plan consists of two parts: blessings and reminders.

Blessings are given to reward positive behavior.

Blessings are:

H (HANDS) – being helpful to others

O (ORDER) – being orderly and responsible with classroom materials

W (WORK)– being diligent in work

I (INTENTIONAL ACTIONS) – choosing to do the right thing, even when difficult

A (ATTITUDE) – showing a kind and respectful attitude to others

C (COURTESY) – showing good manners and thoughtfulness

T (TALKING) – using words of kindness to others

Reminders are given to help improve or curb inappropriate behavior.

Reminders are:

H (HANDS) – creating a disturbance, bothering others

O (ORDER) – messy desk area, dress code violation, lack of care for school materials

W (WORK)– homework or classwork not completed, record sheet not signed

I (INTENTIONAL ACTIONS) – fighting, cheating, lying, defiance

A (ATTITUDE) – disrespectful towards adults or other children

C (COURTESY) – breaking classroom and playground rules, lack of manners

T (TALKING) – talking out of turn, not raising hand

Each child will have a daily record sheet in his/her folder noting the blessings and reminders given for the day. This record sheet needs to be signed NIGHTLY by a parent. This is to insure constant communication between school and home and to involve parents before a serious problem exists.

REWARDS

The students earn tokens that they can use to purchase items. The students get one token for every blessing. They can then use the tokens to purchase rewards in the SCA Reward Store. The SCA Reward Store will be open on the last school day of each month. Students can choose to save or spend their tokens.

REMINDERS

If a child, at anytime, receives 3 reminders in one day, a phone call or note to the parents will be sent home. If a child receives 4 reminders at anytime, the student will need to talk to the principal.
